APPENDIX A

PROJECT CANADA SURVEY SERIES

Methodology

The Project Canada Research Program has been carried out from The University of Lethbridge. National surveys of adults 18 and over have been conducted in 1975, 1980, 1985, 1990, and 1995, complementary surveys of youth in 1984 and 1992. Adult and youth surveys in 2000 will complete the program.

THE ADULT SURVEYS

Data Collection. All five of the adult surveys have made use of self-administered questionnaires and have been conducted by mail over approximately a four-month period. Questionnaires have ranged from eleven to twenty pages in length, and have included 300 to 400 variables. The goal has been to generate extensive information on life in Canada, with specific attention given to social issues, intergroup relations, and religion. With minor variations, the procedures have involved (1) mailing the questionnaire with a front-page cover letter, (2) sending a follow-up postcard, and (3) mailing a second questionnaire. Surveys typically have been carried out over a four-month period.

Sampling. A representative sample of about 1,100 cases is sufficient to claim a confidence level of 95% and a confidence interval of four percentage points when generalizing to the Canadian adult population. *Size and representativeness* are the two key criteria in being able to generalize with accuracy from a sample to a population. Considerable care therefore has been taken to ensure that both standards have been met.

Concerning size, an interest in provincial comparisons resulted in 1,917 cases being gathered in 1975; 1,482 in 1980, 1,630 in 1985, 1,472 in 1990, and 1,765 in 1995. With respect to representativeness, the nation has been stratified by province (ten) and community size (>100,000, 99-10,000, <10,000), with the sample drawn proportionate to the populations involved. As resources have improved, the number of communities being drawn on has increased from 30 in 1975 to 43 in 1980, 104 in 1985, 145 in 1990, and 228 in 1995. Participants have been randomly selected using telephone directories. Discrepancies between the sample and population characteristics have been corrected by weighting for provincial and community size, along with gender and age. Each of the five samples has been weighted down to about twelve hundred cases in order to minimize the use of large weight factors (i.e., three or more).

As can be seen in Table 1, all of the samples are highly representative of the Canadian population. Samples of this size and composition, as noted, should be accurate within about four percentage points on most questionnaire items, 19 times in 20 similar surveys. Comparisons with similar Gallup poll items, for example, have consistently found this to be the case.

The Panels. A major interest of the ongoing national surveys has been to monitor social change and stability. Each survey sample since 1980 has consisted of (a) a core of people who participated in the previous survey and (b) new participants, who are used to create a full national sample of about 1,500 case0s. For example, while the first 1975 survey was a typical cross-sectional survey with 1,917 participants, the *Project Can80* sample of 1,482 people included 1,056 who had also been involved in 1975.

The 1995 sample of 1,765 cases was comprised of 816 people who participated in previous surveys and 949 new cases. Of the 816, 400 had participated in the 1975 survey. They are comprised of the ongoing core who have participated in all the surveys (236) and a special panel supplement (164), which was obtained through our adding as many of the original 1975 participants as we could who we had "lost" between 1975 and 1995.

Various panels can be constructed from the surveys according to the five-year interval desired (e.g., 1975-85, 1980-90, 1990-95). While no claim is being made that these panels are representative of all Canadians, they do provide intriguing and novel data on the attitudes, outlooks, and behaviour of a core of Canadians over the last guarter of the twentieth century. The panels can be weighted as deemed desirable by data users.

Return Rates. For national surveys, the Project Canada return rates have been relatively high - 52% in 1975, 65% in 1980, and about 60% in 1985, 1990, and 1995. We tend to hear from about 65% of the people who have participated previously and just over 50% of those being contacted for the first time - favourable to the seldom-reported cooperation rates of (at best) around 65% obtained with face-to-face and telephone interviews.

Funding. The 1975 survey was carried out for a cost of about \$14,000 and had four major sources: the United Church of Canada (\$2,000), the CBC (\$3,000), the Solicitor General of Canada (\$5,000), and the University of Lethbridge (\$4,000). In 1980, the panel portion of the survey was made possible by grants from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada (\$10,000) and the United Church of Canada (\$2,000). The second phase of Project

Can80, which involved filling the core out into a full national sample, cost approximately \$8,000 and was funded primarily by the University of Lethbridge. Project Can85 was funded completely by the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada (\$45,000), Project Can90 and Project Can95 were both funded by the Lilly Endowment (about \$65,000 each). A contract for analysis of pertinent findings for the Secretary of State helped to make Project Teen Canada 84 possible, while Project Teen Canada 92 was funded by the Lilly Endowment (some \$50,000 each).

THE YOUTH SURVEYS

The "Project Teen Canada" national surveys were also conducted over approximately four months each and completed in 1984 and 1992 respectively. They bore the titles of Project Teen Canada 84 and Project Teen Canada 92.

The Questionnaire. The questionnaires were each 15 pages in length and included some 250 variables; they appeared to take about 30-45 minutes to complete. Since a major objective of the youth surveys was to produce data making intergenerational comparisons possible, the youth surveys contained many of the same items that appeared in the Project Canada adult guestionnaires. The topics addressed were fairly comprehensive and, like the adult surveys, included themes such as sources of enjoyment, leisure activities, values, beliefs, personal concerns, family life, relationships, views of Canada, views of Canadians, perception of major issues, and hopes and expectations.

Sampling. In both of the youth surveys, samples of 3,600 teenagers were pursued, a figure which, if representatively selected, made it possible to generalize to the overall adolescent population (about 2 million) with a high level of accuracy (within about 3% points, either way, 19 times in 20). A sample of that size also increases the accuracy of analyses within the aggregate — such as region, community size, gender, and race.

Table 1. Population and Sample Characteristics:

Since our interest was in that segment of young people on the verge of adulthood, the samples were restricted to Canadians 15 to 19 years old in grades 10 to 12 across Canada, including CEGEP's in Quebec. These three grades encompass some two-thirds of those between the ages of 15 and 19. Moreover, some 65% of the remaining one-third not in high school — including, obviously teens in post-secondary institutions — were there for one year or more. Moreover, concerning the charge that we missed the dropouts, clearly some of our participants proceeded to drop out while, according to Statistics Canada, as many as 1 in 4 current student had dropped out at some point in their schooling. Therefore, dropouts were not omitted. To get a reading of secondary students has been to get a highly comprehensive snapshot of the latest "emerging generation" as it passed through high school.

In pursuing the sample size goal of 3,600 high school students, the decision was made to randomly select individual high school classrooms rather than individual students, because of the significant administrative advantages and minimal negative consequences for a random sample. The design involved choosing one classroom in each school selected. Based on an average class size of perhaps 25 students, this meant that some 150 schools needed to participate (N=3750). On the basis of a projected response rate of about 75% approximately 200 schools were selected to comprise the sample.

The schools were chosen using multi-stage stratified and cluster sampling procedures. The country was first stratified according to the five major regions, with each region then stratified according to community size (100,000 and over, 99,000 to 10,000, less than 10,000). Each community size category was in turn stratified according to school system (public, separate, private). Specific communities within each size stratum were then randomly selected, with the number of communities drawn from each province in the Prairie and Atlantic regions based on population. Finally, one school in each of these communities was chosen randomly. The number of schools selected in cities with over 100,000 population was proportional to their population in their region. The specific grade of the classroom involved was also randomly designated.

The Administration of the Survey. Guidance counsellors or an appropriate substitute at each school were contacted, and asked to (i) choose a classroom which they viewed as representative of the requested grade, and (ii) personally administer the questionnaire. They were instructed to stress that participation was voluntary, and that anonymity and confidentiality would be honoured. Upon completion of the questionnaires, counsellors were asked to place them in the pre-paid postal envelope provided "in full view of the students," and to seal the envelope in their presence.

The Response. Questionnaires were returned from 152 of the 200 designated classrooms — in 1984 and 180 of 193 in 1992 — return rates of 76% and 93% respectively (see Table 2). The remaining schools either

declined to participate, or did not respond to requests to do so. A total of 3,664 questionnaires were received, with 134 of these discarded because they had been filled out by students younger than 15 or older than 19. The number of usable questionnaires totalled 3,530 in 1984 and 3,891 in 1992.

The samples have been weighted for region and community size, along with gender in the case of the 1992 survey. In their final, weighted form, the samples are highly representative of Canadian high school students, 15 to 19. The minor variations which do exist appear to reflect methodological issues rather than differences between the population and the sample. Marital status for 35 to 59 year-old adults in the general population is a fairly crude estimate of the marital status of the parents of teenagers, overestimating the proportion of single people. Population religious affiliation for teens typically has been given to the census takers by adults, rather than teenagers. Parents who were nominally "something" may well have been more reluctant than their teenage offspring to have said they were "nothing."

In sum, the samples are both sufficiently large and representative of Canadian teenagers 15 to 19 to permit generalizations to the population with a very high level of accuracy. On most items in the questionnaires, the national results should come within about three percentage points of the results of other surveys probing the teenage population, 19 times in 20.

Further details relating to each of the *Project Canada* surveys, including weighting, are included in the appendices of each individual codebook.

Project Can95 Methodological Summary

1. Background

- The survey was the fifth in the *Project Canada* adult surveys. It was carried out by mail between approximately April 15th and August 15th of 1995. Reginald W. Bibby was the principal investigator, assisted by Project Manager Reggie Gordon Bibby, Jr. and a number of student research assistants.
- *Project Can95* was comprised of a sample of 400 people who had participated since 1975, 41 since 1980, 159 from 1985, and 216 from 1990. This ongoing core of 816 respondents was supplemented by 949 new participants, to form a total sample of 1,765 people. Together with *Project Can75, Project Can80, Project Can85* and *Project Can90*, this survey provides 1975-80-85-90-95 trend and panel data.
- The funding for the survey was provided by the Lilly Endowment.

2. The Questionnaire

- As with *Project Can75, Project Can80, Project Can85*, and *Project Can90*, the 1995 questionnaire was constructed to provide comprehensive data pertaining to three main subject areas being investigated: social issues, intergroup relations, and religion. In order to monitor change, many of the items in the 1975, 1980, 1985, and 1990 versions were included in the questionnaire, with new items added to clarify the earlier findings as well as update the content more generally.
- Length: 20 pages; variables: about 400; completion time: 1-2 1/2 hours.

3. Sampling and Procedures

- The effort to locate the 1,472 people who had participated in the 1990 survey began in the spring of 1995 and continued into the summer. It appears 1,030 of the "PC90" respondents were located (70%), with 652 (63%) submitting usable questionnaires. In short, almost 50% of the 1990 sample were part of the new sample. They included 236 respondents who had participated in *all five* of the surveys. The majority of past participants were contacted in early April, although the search for 1975 participants continued throughout the duration of the project.
- In an effort to increase the 1975-95 panel size, a concerted effort was made—with the assistance of enhanced (if pre-Internet search engine) CD-ROM-assisted telephone tracking—to locate additional individuals who had participated in 1975 but had been "lost" between 1975 and 1990. As a result of these efforts, some 400 "leads" were identified and mailed questionnaires. A total of 265 (66%) returned questionnaires, with 164 matches and 101 not. The former were added to the 1975-95 panel, raising its size to 400. The latter were added to the sample of new respondents for 1995.
- Based on previous survey experiences, a projected required supplemental sample of about 1,800 cases
 was drawn in the spring which, when combined with the core from 1990, would produce a final sample of
 adequate size and sufficient representativeness to permit high accuracy generalizations to the Canadian
 population. As before, Canada was stratified by province and community size (>100,000, 99-10,000,
 <10,000), and the overall sample drawn proportionate to the national population, with 228 communities
 involved. Participants were randomly selected using telephone directories. As in 1980 and 1985, it was
 anticipated that weighting according to provincial and community size, as well as gender would be required,
 with age weighting required since the ongoing cores would have aged anywhere from five to twenty years.
- Follow-up procedures were the same as used in 1985 and 1990. Approximately two to three weeks after the initial mailing, the pre-paid post-card—functioning as a reminder and asking about the status of the questionnaire—was sent, followed about three weeks later by a second copy of the questionnaire, with "Second Request" stamped on its cover letter.
- In the fall of 1995, participants were sent a thank-you post-card, informing them how the results were being disseminated, and welcoming further inquiries. The 236 individuals who had been part of all five surveys were also sent complimentary copies of *The Bibby Report* (Toronto: Stoddart, 1995).

4. Response

- Number of useable questionnaires received: 1,765.
- Return rate: 61%.

We estimated it was possible for 1,350 of the "new 1995 sample" to return the questionnaire, with 848 (63%) doing so. The data collection covered four months.

The final national sample was comprised of 1,765 cases—400 from 1975, 41 from 1980, 159 from 1985, 216 from 1990, 101 non-1975 matches, and 848 totally new additions. These responses from 2,780 contacts (1,030 from 1990, 1,350 in 1995, 400 leads for 1975) represent a combined return rate for the ongoing cores and new participants of 64%.

5. Representativeness

- These 1,765 cases have been weighted for provincial and community size, along with gender and age. In order to minimize the use of large weight factors, the sample again was reduced—to 1,239 cases.
- So weighted, the sample is highly representative of the Canadian population (see Table 1). A representative sample of this size should be accurate within about four percentage points on most items, 19 times in 20 similar surveys.
